I would like to present to you the 2014 Department of Public Safety Annual Report. This year's report is dedicated to local businessman Tom Norrenberns who passed away unexpectedly this year. Mr. Norrenberns was a former council member, park board member, and was a part of many local civic organizations and projects through the years. Mr. Norrenberns was a roll model for others as a businessman, community leader and in his personal life. His support to me personally, the Police Department in general, and the City as a whole helped to make Mascoutah a better place to live for all residents.

2014 saw many Cities in distress, and issues with police departments nationwide. The Mascoutah Police Department made very effort to be prepared, well trained and professional during these events, and will continue to do so in the future, as it has in the past.

The City enjoyed a very low level of reported crimes through 2014. Officers continued to make contacts with businesses and residents to strengthen the cooperation between the two to stop crime before it happens. We believe that we become more successful each year in getting residents to report suspicious activity to prevent crimes from happening by calling the police immediately.

The Police division had some personnel changes in 2014. We had the departure of one officer, and the retirement of Sgt. Kathy Kelsheimer after 22 years of service to the department and community. With that, the department hired two officers to fill those openings which were created. Those two officers both had prior police experience and we expect them both to become valuable members of the department.

This brings staffing back to 13 officers and one administrative assistant, who serve 24 hours day, seven days a week. Officers received over 540 hours of training from our training partners in various subjects, along with self-defense and firearms training provided by in-house instructors during the year.

The EMS Division saw its calls for service rise in 2014 to 923, which kept them busy all year, not just in the City but the Rural District also. EMS also performed 62 blood pressure checks, 1 car seat inspection, and taught 107 people CPR during the year. EMS personnel are always present at City functions to provide services, and are ready to respond to our community needs when ever they are called.

The Division is staffed 24 hours a day seven days a week and has 5 full-time Para-Medics and 7 part-time Para-Medic personnel, who serve not only the City but the surrounding Rural Fire District.

The Public Safety Department will continue to strive to keep Mascoutah a safe city that we can all be proud of in the coming year.





PEEL'S NINE RULES OF POLICING

1829 - Sir Robert Peel, founder of modern policing


- The basic mission for which the police exist is to prevent crime and disorder.
- The ability of the police to perform their duties is dependent upon public approval of police actions.
- Police must secure the willing cooperation of the public in voluntary observance of the law to be able to secure and maintain the respect of the public.
- The degree of cooperation of the public that can be secured diminishes proportionately to the necessity of the use of physical force.
- Police seek and preserve public favor not by catering to public opinion but by constantly demonstrating absolute impartial service to the law.
- Police use physical force to the extent necessary to secure observance of the law or to restore order only when the exercise of persuasion, advice and warning is found to be insufficient.
- Police, at all times, should maintain a relationship with the public that gives reality to the historic tradition that the police are the public and the public are the police; the police being only members of the public who are paid to give full-time attention to duties which are incumbent on every citizen in the interests of community welfare and existence.
- Police should always direct their action strictly towards their functions and never appear to usurp the powers of the judiciary.
- The test of police efficiency is the absence of crime and disorder, not the visible evidence of police action in dealing with it.





AMOUNT AND PERCENTAGE USED OF CITY BUDGET BY DEPARTMENT





CITY ORDINANCE CODE VIOLATIONS/ENFORCEMENT


The police department continued a program toward improving the over all appearance of the City and its neighborhoods. Officers have begun to actively look for City ordinance violations regarding high weeds and uncut grass, derelict vehicles, junk and debris accumulating at properties in the City.

Officers issued written warnings to violators indicating what was needed to bring the property into compliance with City ordinances. Officers on many occasions worked with residents on extensions of deadlines to get the property in order. The goal was to clean up the properties and gain compliance, not to issue tickets to residents.

While some tickets were ultimately issued, in the majority of the cases, compliance was obtained from the residents by cutting weeds or the removal of debris or vehicles from the property.


Throughout the year there were 101 violations located and handled by officers. A break down by violation is given in the chart below.

Also during the year several properties were cited and turned over the City Attorney's Office to begin abatement in court proceedings due to the poor condition of the entire property and buildings. This is a continuing joint effort. If a property is foreclosed it becomes very difficult and time consuming to get work done on it. The City knows that poorly maintained property is a problem for the whole City and not just the neighborhood it is in. This effort will continue to keep our City well maintained.
