Greetings,

I would like to present to you the 2013 Department of Public Safety Annual Report. This year's report is dedicated to Monsignor Jerome Hartlien, who served not only his parish for years, but also bettered the entire community of Mascoutah with his work on projects throughout the City.

The members of the Police and EMS Departments also try to contribute to the quality of life for residents and visitors to the City. EMS provides visits to the senior center, does CPR training for organizations, and blood pressure checks and car seat inspections at the headquarters. The police department stops in and checks on businesses, while providing regular police services to all citizens when needed. The officers themselves have begun a charitable organization that has donated to several local causes and has provided a generous Christmas to several families in need each year.

This year the City continued to enjoy some of the lowest overall levels of reported crime in the last several years. The Police Department takes great pride in protecting it's Citizens. Four people were arrested and charged with separate Burglaries this past year for preying on residents and businesses in town. The police department alone cannot keep crime down; it is a community effort, working together that accomplishes this. When Citizens do not become complacent about crime, and work with the police to deter criminals from operating in Mascoutah, our City improves every year. This was true again in 2013, and our community is the better for it.

The Police division is staffed by 13 officers and one administrative assistant, who serve 24 hours day, seven days a week. Officers received almost 300 hours of training from our training partners in various subjects, along with self-defense and firearms training provided by in-house instructors.

The EMS Division saw its calls for service stay consistent in 2013 at 806. This continues to remain stable for the yearly average for the City and Rural District. EMS also performed 106 blood pressure checks and 12 car seat inspections during the year, and they are always present at City functions to provide services. The EMS division is ready to respond to our community needs when ever they are called.

The Division is staffed 24 hours a day seven days a week and has 5 full-time Para-Medics and 9 part-time Para-Medic personnel, who serve not only the City but the surrounding Rural Fire District as well.

As we enter a new year, Public Safety will continue to provide the best service that we can to the residents and visitors of the City of Mascoutah. The Public Safety Department will strive to keep Mascoutah a safe city that we can all be proud of in the coming years.





PEEL'S NINE RULES OF POLICING

1829 - Sir Robert Peel, founder of modern policing


- The basic mission for which the police exist is to prevent crime and disorder.
- The ability of the police to perform their duties is dependent upon public approval of police actions.
- Police must secure the willing cooperation of the public in voluntary observance of the law to be able to secure and maintain the respect of the public.
- The degree of cooperation of the public that can be secured diminishes proportionately to the necessity of the use of physical force.
- Police seek and preserve public favor not by catering to public opinion but by constantly demonstrating absolute impartial service to the law.
- Police use physical force to the extent necessary to secure observance of the law or to restore order only when the exercise of persuasion, advice and warning is found to be insufficient.
- Police, at all times, should maintain a relationship with the public that gives reality to the historic tradition that the police are the public and the public are the police; the police being only members of the public who are paid to give full-time attention to duties which are incumbent on every citizen in the interests of community welfare and existence.
- Police should always direct their action strictly towards their functions and never appear to usurp the powers of the judiciary.
- The test of police efficiency is the absence of crime and disorder, not the visible evidence of police action in dealing with it.





AMOUNT AND PERCENTAGE USED OF CITY BUDGET BY DEPARTMENT





CITY ORDINANCE CODE VIOLATIONS/ENFORCEMENT


The police department continued a program toward improving the over all appearance of the City and its neighborhoods. Officers have begun to actively look for City ordinance violations regarding high weeds and uncut grass, derelict vehicles, junk and debris accumulating at properties in the City.

Officers issued written warnings to violators indicating what was needed to bring the property into compliance with City ordinances. Officers on many occasions worked with residents on extensions of deadlines to get the property in order. The goal was to clean up the properties and gain compliance, not to issue tickets to residents.

While some tickets were ultimately issued, in over 95% of the cases, compliance was obtained from the residents by cutting weeds or the removal of debris or vehicles from the property.


Throughout the year there were 90 violations located and handled by officers. A break down by violation is given in the chart below.

Also during the year several properties were cited and turned over the City Attorney's Office to begin abatement in court proceedings due to the poor condition of the entire property and buildings. This is a continuing joint effort. If a property is foreclosed it becomes very difficult and time consuming to get work done on it. The City knows that poorly maintained property is a problem for the whole City and not just the neighborhood it is in. This effort will continue to keep our City well maintained.




