



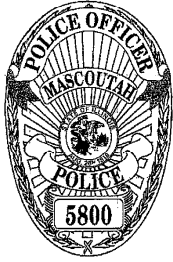

Greetings:

The 2016 Annual Public Safety Report is dedicated to retired Director of Public Safety and Chief of Police Bruce Fleshren. Chief Fleshren served the citizens of Mascoutah as a dedicated member of the Mascoutah Police Department for 21 years. He served as the Chief of Police for the past twelve years. Myself and the other members of the Mascoutah Police Department stand committed to continue the professional, community oriented service to the community that Chief Fleshren provided during his tenure.

Although many cities experienced an increase in violent crime, the City of Mascoutah did not experience this growing trend. This is obviously a result of the positive relationship between our citizens and the officers entrusted with the security and protection of this city. We continue to work toward maintaining and building upon this positive relationship. We encourage all residents to be engaged with our officers to report any and all suspicious activity so that any crime can be thwarted before anyone is victimized. Our officers understand that preventing crime is only accomplished with the help and support of the residents and business owners of our community.

2016 saw a 41% reduction in theft related crimes. Violent crimes saw a 62% reduction in 2016. The police department will continue to conduct high visibility patrol so that this trend can continue. Officers responded to 2192 reported incidents throughout the year, which included reported crimes, traffic stops, and suspicious activities, among other public service activities. Officers continue to receive high quality training so that our professional standards can be maintained.

The EMS Division had 1043 calls for service, which is a 15% increase from 2015. EMS personnel are always present at city functions to provide services. The EMS Division is staffed with 5 full-time Paramedics and 8 part-time paramedics, who serve not only the City but the surrounding Rural Fire Protection District.

This upcoming year the Police Department will make improvements to the communications/dispatching operation, the policy and procedure manual along with the implementation of a new records management system. These changes will improve the efficiency and overall operation of the department. In addition, the police department is anticipating holding the first National Night Out event, scheduled in October of 2017.

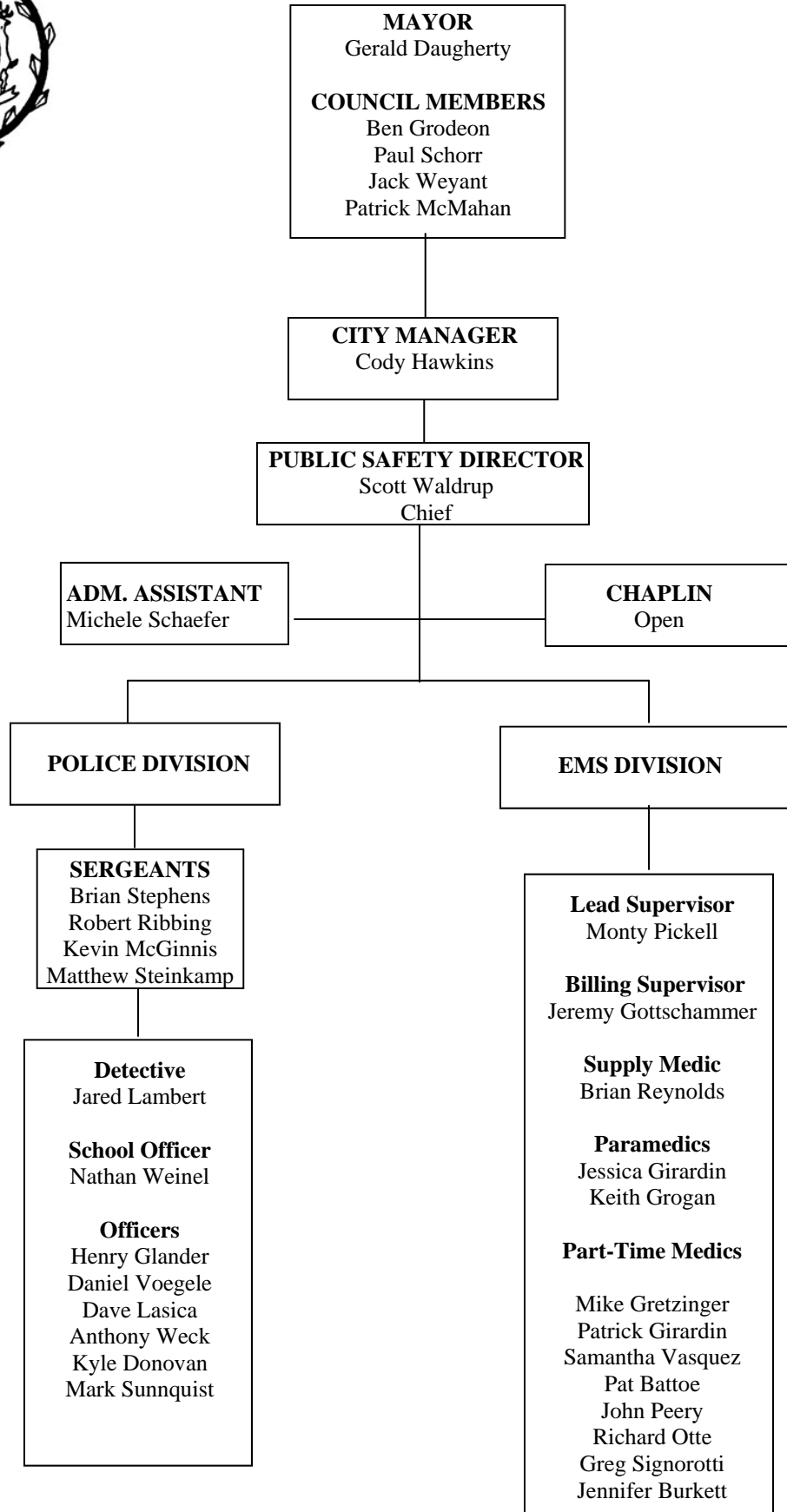

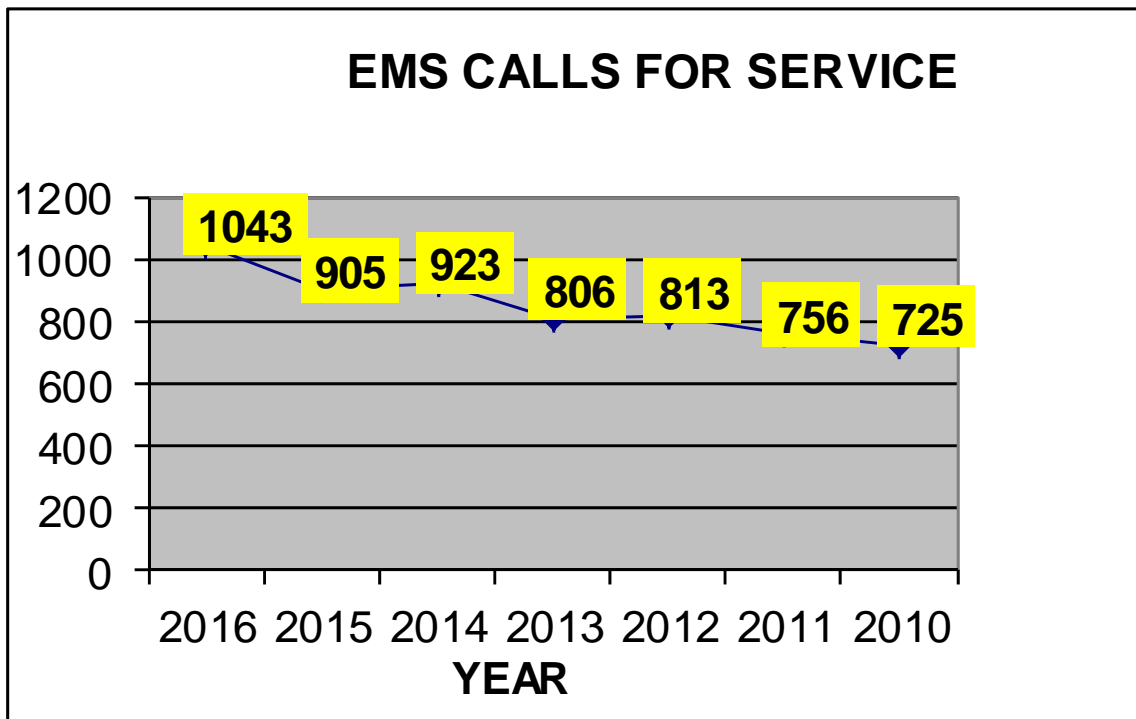

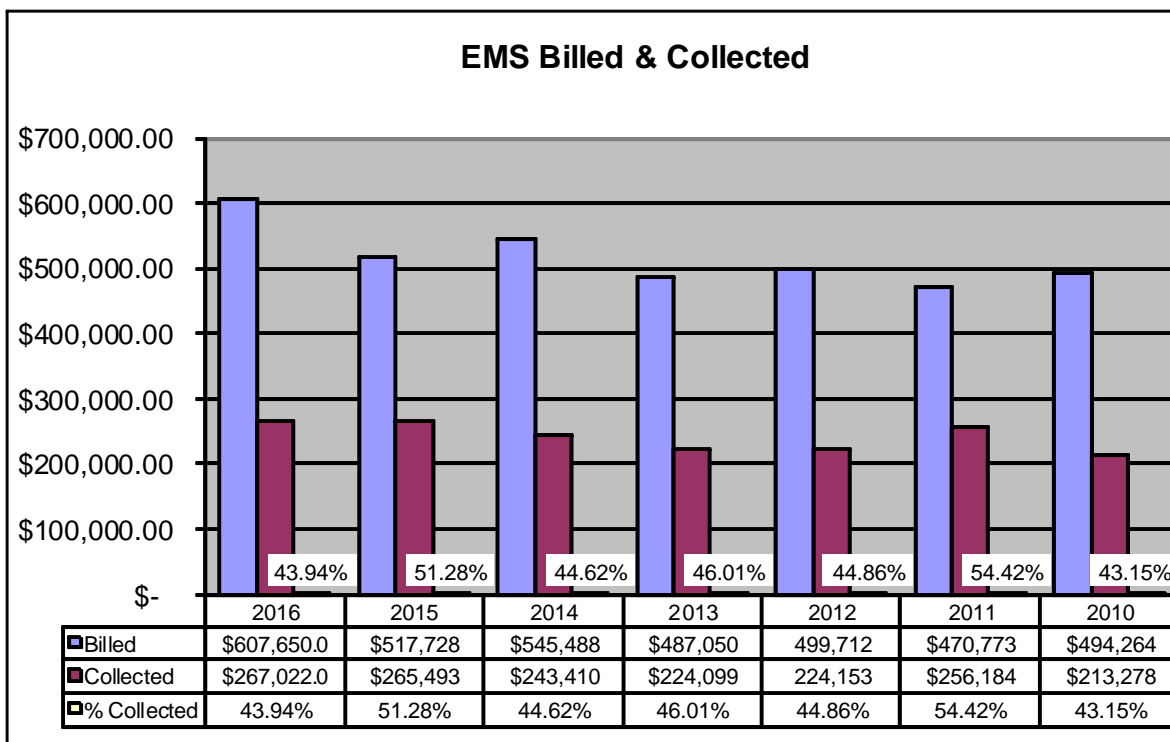

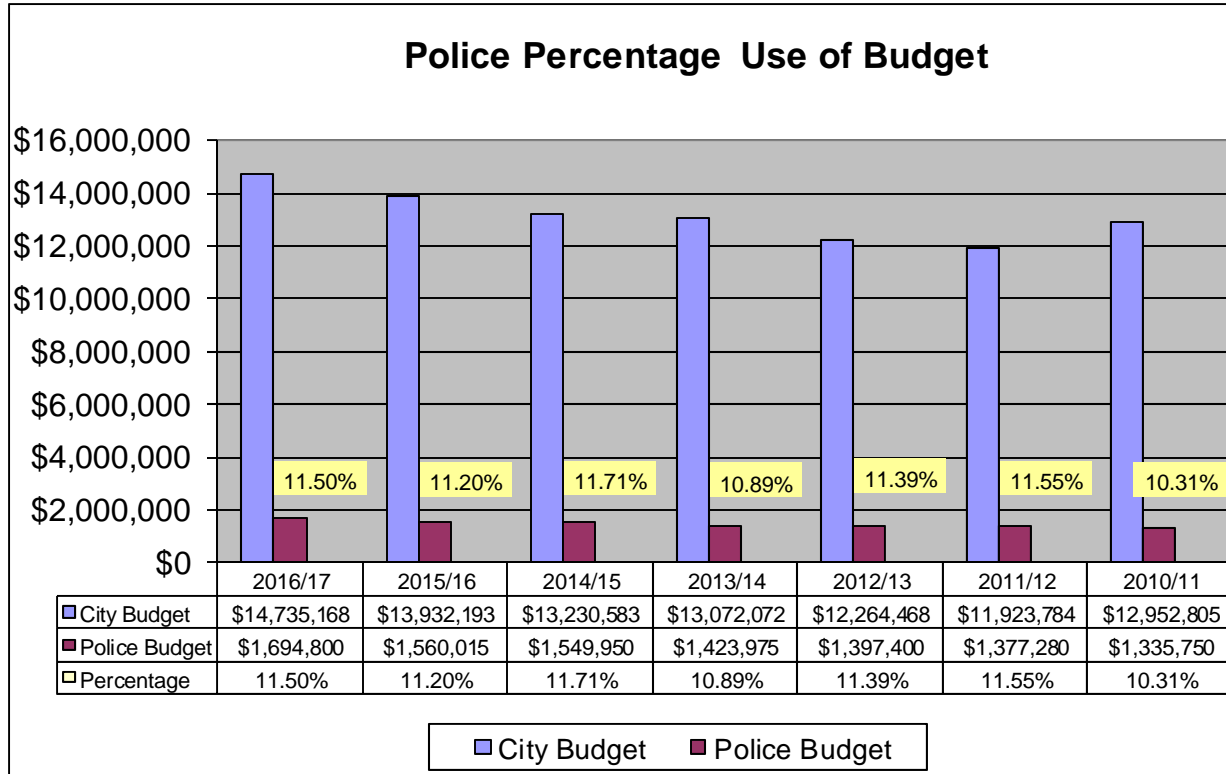

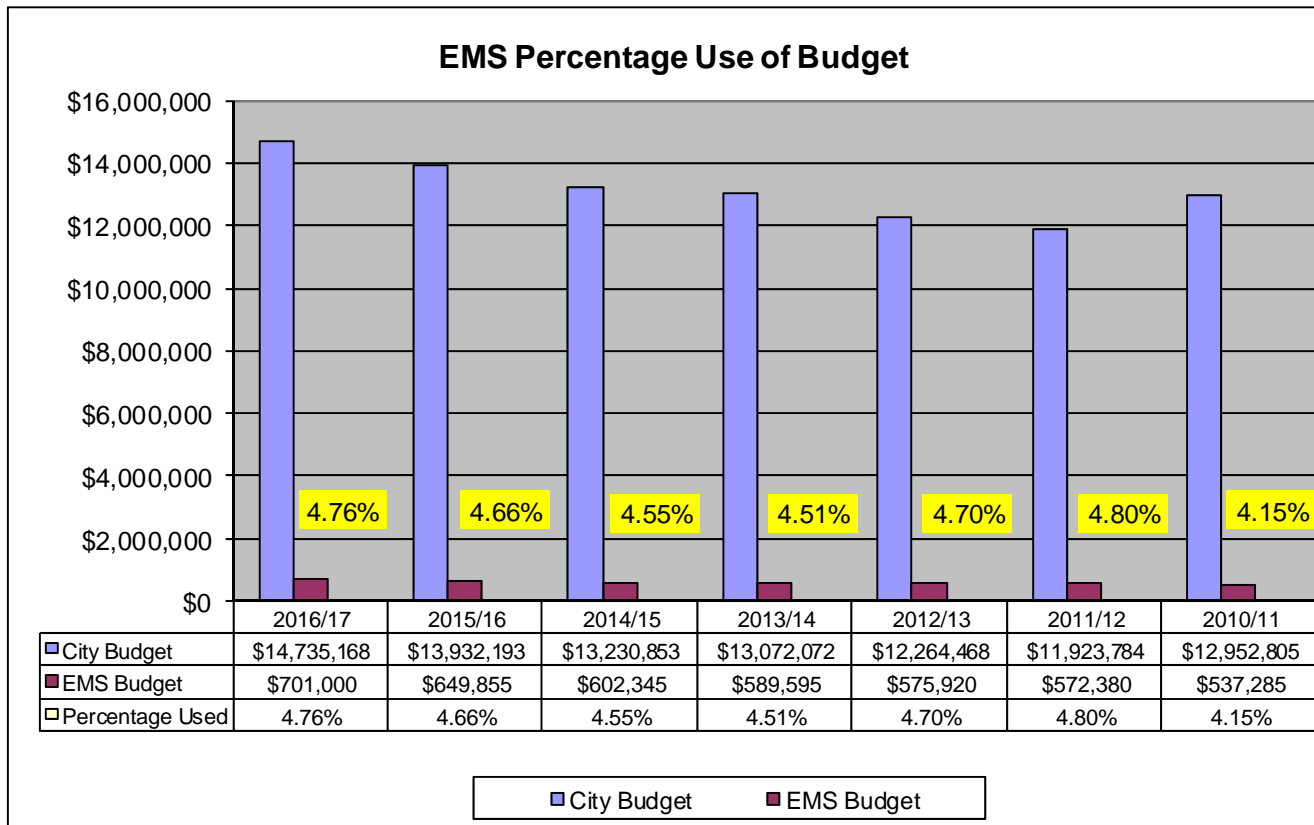
