Greetings:

The 2017 Annual Public Safety Report is dedicated to the Emergency First Responders who work for the Mascoutah Police, Fire and EMS Departments. These men and women are professionals who are dedicated to serving the citizens of this community.

Although many cities experienced an increase in violent crime, the City of Mascoutah did not experience this growing trend. This is obviously a result of the positive relationship between our citizens and the officers entrusted with the security and protection of this city. We continue to work toward maintaining and building upon this positive relationship. We encourage all residents to be engaged with our officers to report any and all suspicious activity so that any crime can be thwarted before anyone is victimized. Our officers understand that preventing crime is only accomplished with the help and support of the residents and business owners of our community.

2017 saw a 20% increase in total offences, with a 35.5% increase in criminal arrests. We also had a 38% increase in traffic crashes. The police department had a 11.4% increase in traffic citations being issued. The police had a 12% increase in total police activity. Officers responded to 3220 reported incidents throughout the year, which included reported crimes, traffic stops, and suspicious activities, among other public service activities. Officers continue to receive high quality training so that our professional standards can be maintained.

The police department completed a major technological improvement over the past year, being the installation and implementation of a new Records Management and Computer Aided Dispatching System. This updated system allows for record sharing with all agencies within the St. Clair County Region.


In addition, the Police Department hosted the first National Night Out Celebration. This community event was attended by app. 1,500 people. This event is anticipated to increase in attendance this year. Lastly, the Police Department was able to partner with the Ministerial Alliance to host Nationally Recognized Speaker and Best-Selling Author, John O'Leary who spoke to an audience of app. 400 people. In an ever-increasing world of negativity, John's message was uplifting and inspiring to parents, children and all who attended. The police department will continue to explore ideas of additional ways to engage and partner with the community to foster collaboration and mutual respect.

The EMS Division had 1058 calls for service, which is a 1.4% increase from 2016. EMS personnel are always present at city functions to provide services. The EMS Division is staffed with 5 full-time Paramedics and 7 part-time EMT's/paramedics, who serve not only the City but the surrounding Rural Fire Protection District.

The EMS Department was able to recently purchase a new ambulance. Due to the change in our Billing Agency, restructuring of our fee schedule and addition of performing patient transfers we were able to increase revenue \$38,751, which is a 12.6% increase from 2016. This increase should continue over the next year as we realize a full year of these changes.

This upcoming year the Police Department will make improvements to the policy and procedure manual along with the potential implementation of a K-9 officer. In addition, the police department is anticipating holding the second National Night Out event, scheduled for October, 2018.

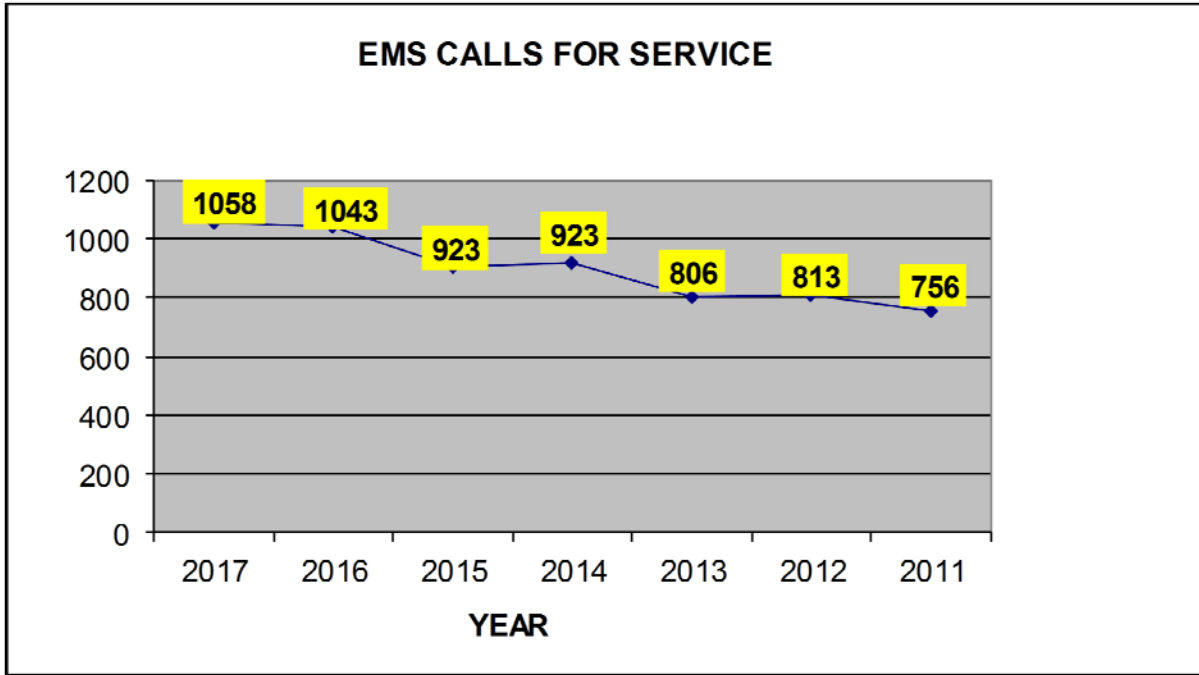

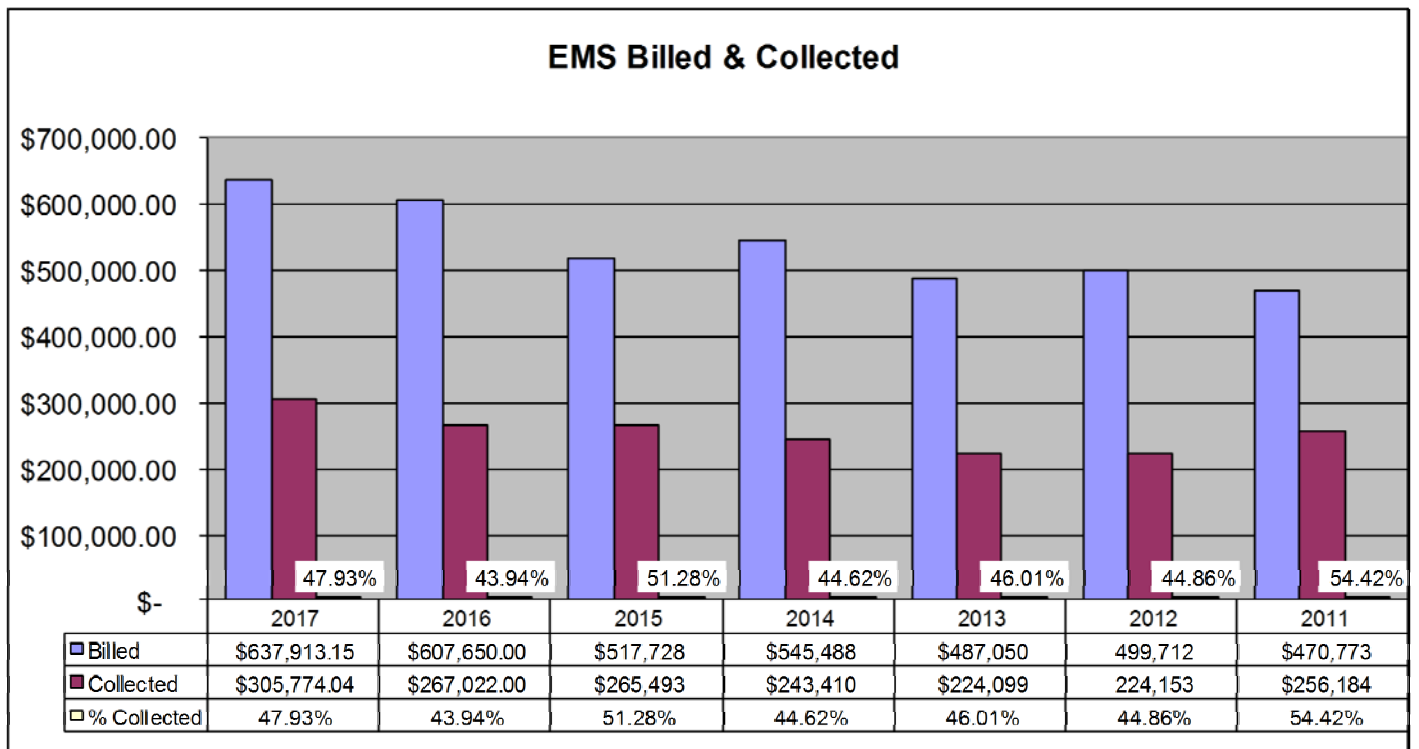

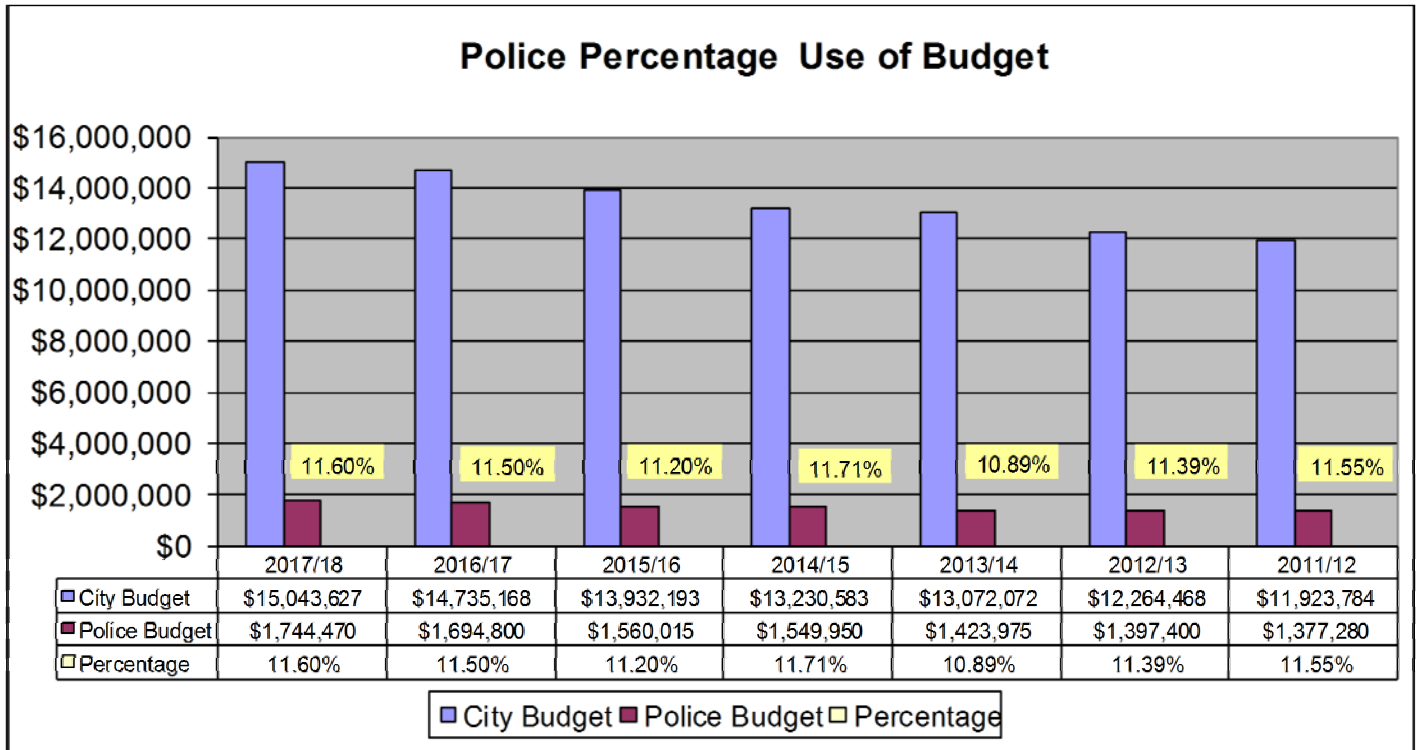

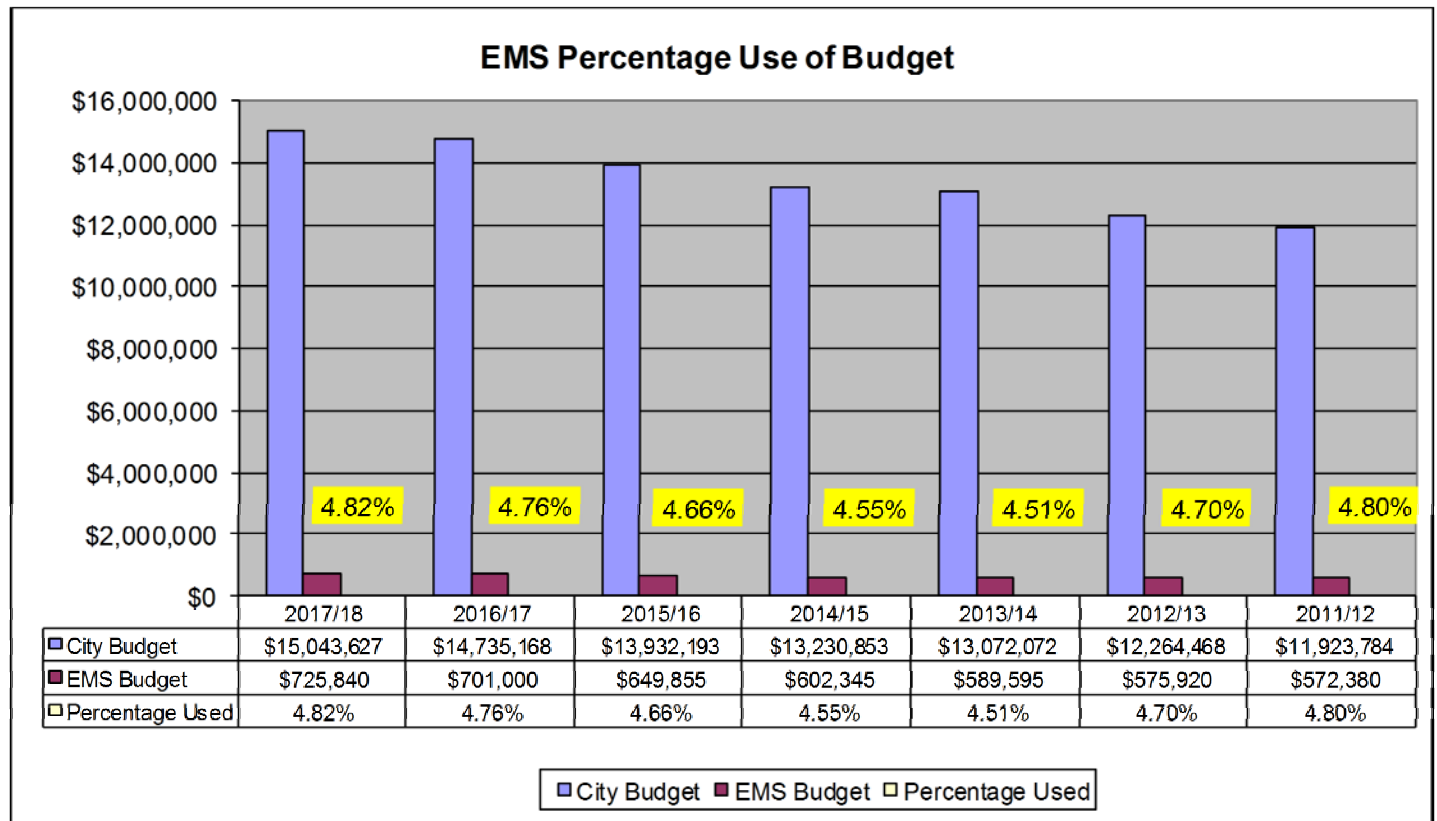
