



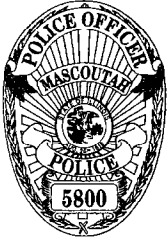

Greetings:

The 2018 Annual Public Safety Report is dedicated to the memory of Lt. Kevin P. McGinnis who passed away September 29, 2018. Lt. McGinnis spent over forty years as a commissioned police officer and served honorably for the Mascoutah Police Department for 23 years. Lt. McGinnis will always be remembered by his friends and co-workers.

Although police responses and calls for service increased in 2018, there was no significance rise in criminal offenses. Officers responded to 3605 reported incidents throughout the year, which included reported crime, traffic stops, and suspicious activities, among other public service activities. This is a 10.7 % increase from 2017.

During 2018 the police department implemented the department's first K-9 program. Officer Joel Veres graduated from the Macon County K-9 Training Academy in December of 2018 with his partner "Axel". This addition will serve the department and citizens of this city for many years to come. A special thanks must go out to all the residents, businesses and organizations that contributed to fundraisers supporting this program.

In order to contribute to the professional development of our officers, the police department has increased our training program. Total training hours for 2018 increased 292%. In 2017 officers completed 220 hours of training compared to 863 total hours in 2018. This training increase is mainly due to comprehensive and consistent on-line training courses which can be completed during scheduled work hours, thus avoiding additional overhead training costs.

The EMS Division had 1251 calls for service, which is an 18.2% increase from 2017. EMS personnel are always present at city functions to provide services. The EMS Division is staffed with 5 full-time Paramedics and 8 part-time paramedics, who serve not only the City but the surrounding Rural Fire Protection District. In 2018 The EMS Department was able to purchase a new ambulance.

This upcoming year the Police Department will complete the implementation of the department's professional policy manual, which will include periodic updates and ongoing training for each officer. In addition, the department is currently in the process of receiving application for the selection of a Police Chaplain. Lastly, the department will be holding the third annual National Night Out Celebration in October of 2019.

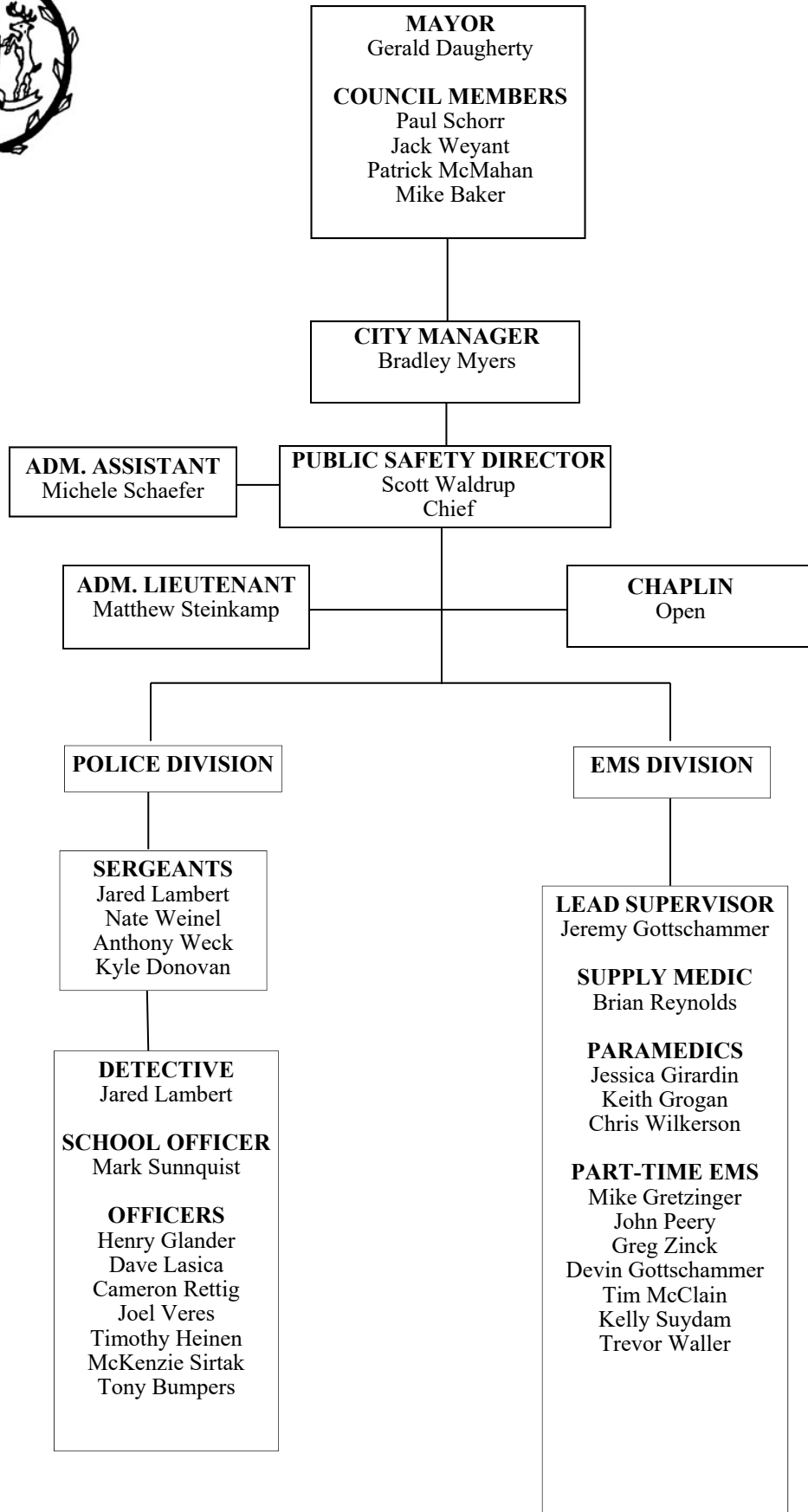

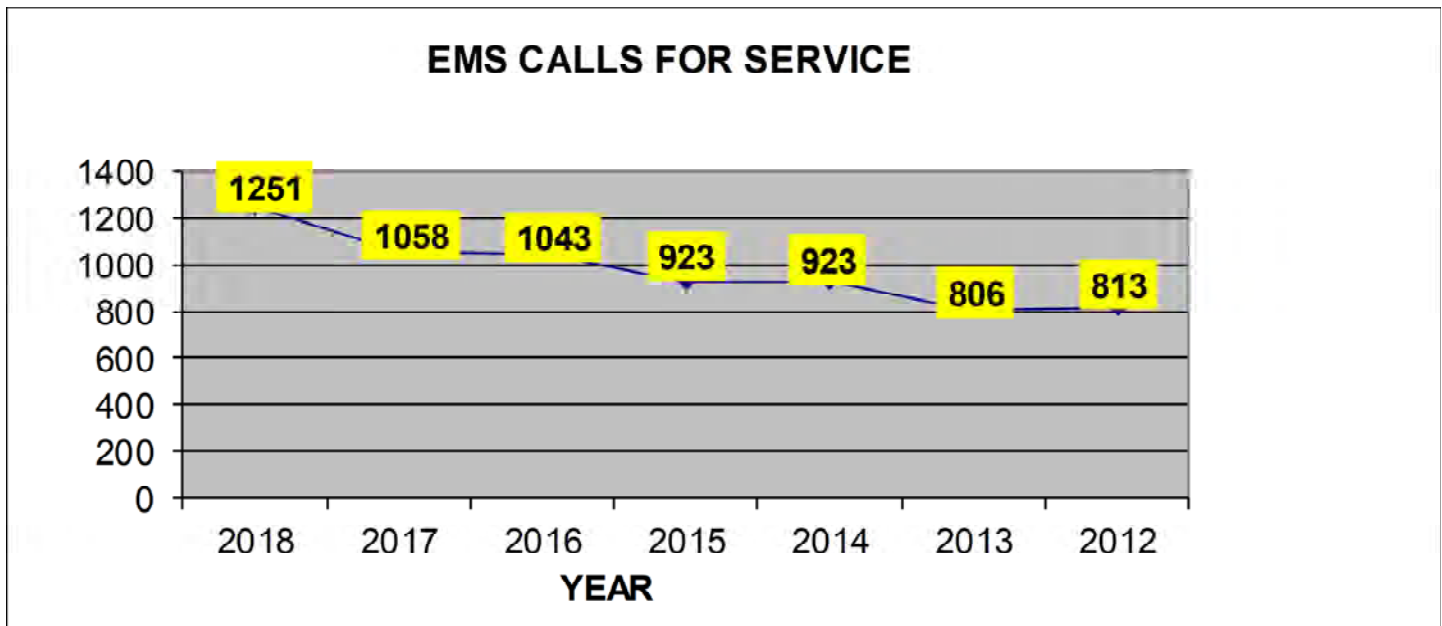

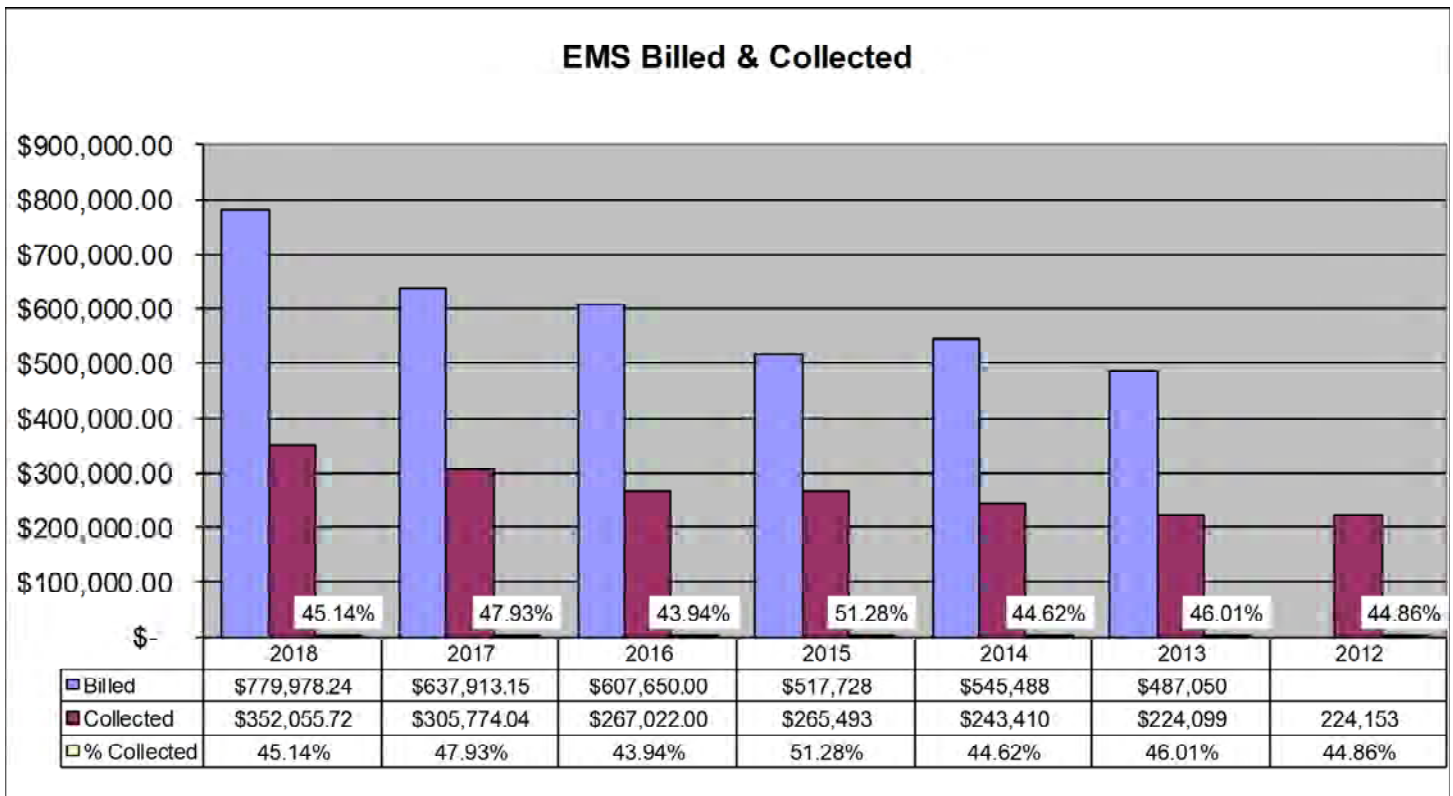

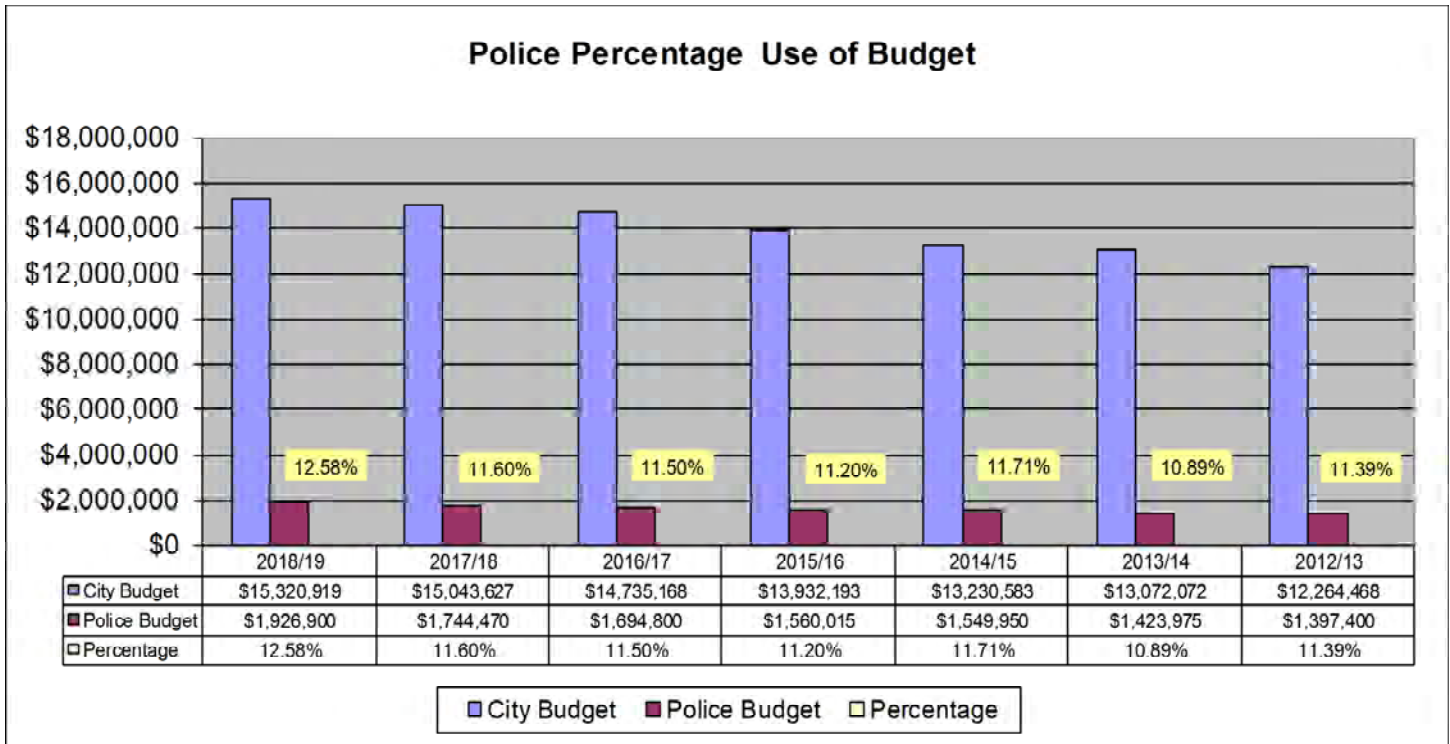
EMS STATISTICS



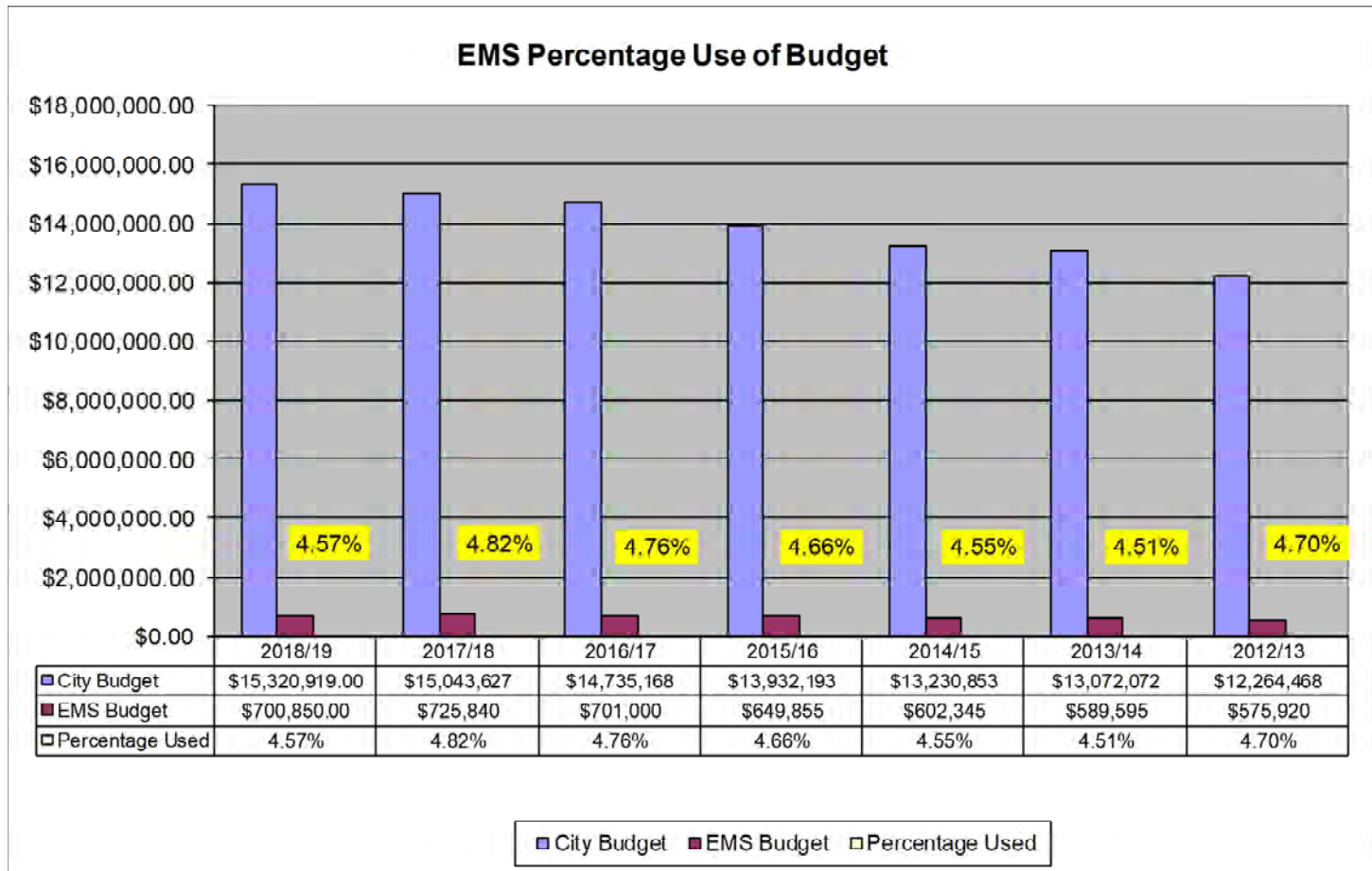

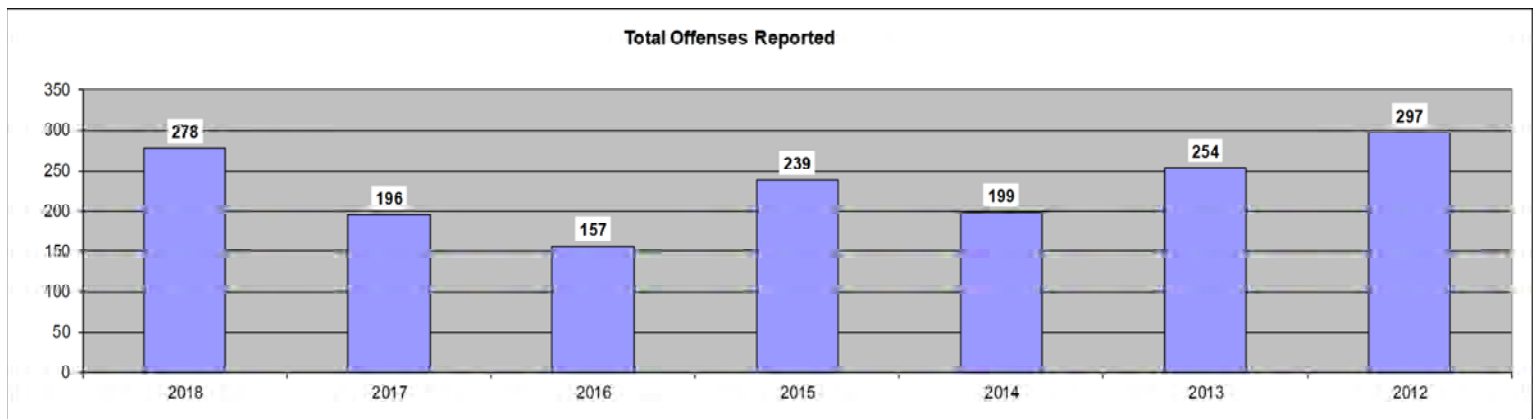
