Greetings:

Although police responses and calls for service increased in 2019, there was no significance rise in criminal offenses. Officers responded to 3841 reported incidents throughout the year, which included reported crime, traffic stops, and suspicious activities, among other public service activities. This is a 6.5 % increase from 2018.

However, there were significant decreases in several crime categories: there was a 36% decrease in theft and burglaries from motor vehicles, and an overall 12.5% decrease in total offences committed in 2019.

In October the police department was awarded a Traffic Safety Enforcement Grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation in the amount of \$17,913.52. This grant will run from October 2019 until October 1, 2020, and contain (8) separate enforcement periods. We have already completed (2) of the enforcement periods for the grant year. This resulted in an increase of traffic related citations of 80.5% and an increase in written warnings of 138.6%. For the grant year we will conduct a total of approximately 312 additional hours of patrol, with no cost to the City.

Additionally, in 2019 the police department implemented the police chaplain program and currently have two police chaplains serving. The police department completed and finalized the Lexipol Policy Manual which will provide solid professional guidance and structure for our officers. All officers receive continual and updated training for all department policies.

In order to contribute to the professional development of our officers, the police department is committed to providing quality training for our officers. Total training hours for 2019 decreased 20.5%. In 2019 officers completed 686 hours of training compared to 863 total hours in 2018. This training decrease is due to budget cuts with SILEC Training Budget cuts from the State of Illinois. However, the 2019 training hours (686) is still 211% higher than the training hours of 2017 (220 hours).

The EMS Division had 1226 calls for service, which is an 1.9% decrease from 2018. EMS personnel are always present at city functions to provide services. The EMS Division is staffed with 5 full-time Paramedics and 8 part-time paramedics, who serve not only the City but the surrounding Rural Fire Protection District. In 2018 The EMS Department was able to purchase a new stretcher for the ambulance.

This upcoming year the Police Department will be holding the fourth annual National Night Out Celebration in October of 2020.

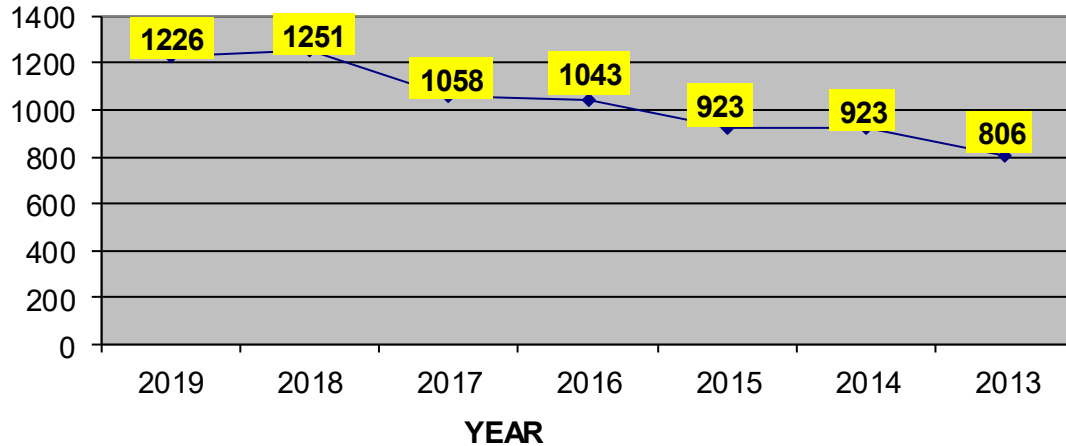

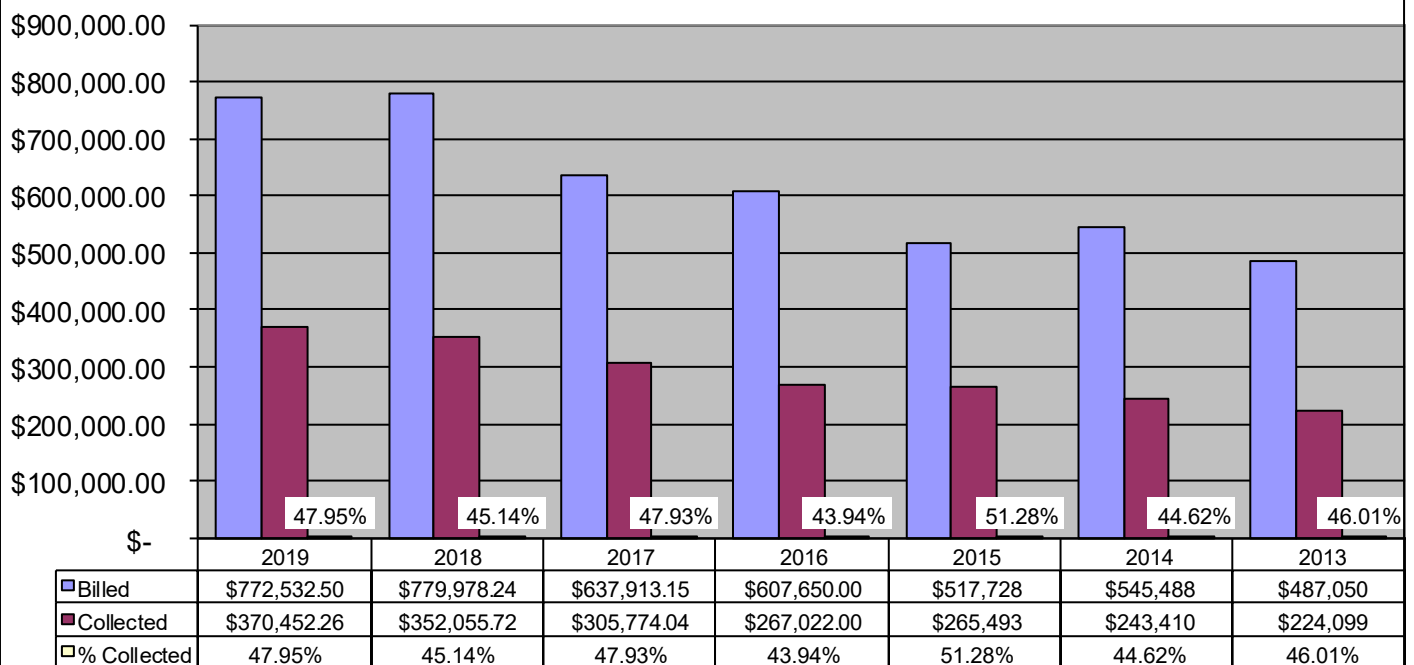

EMS CALLS FOR SERVICE

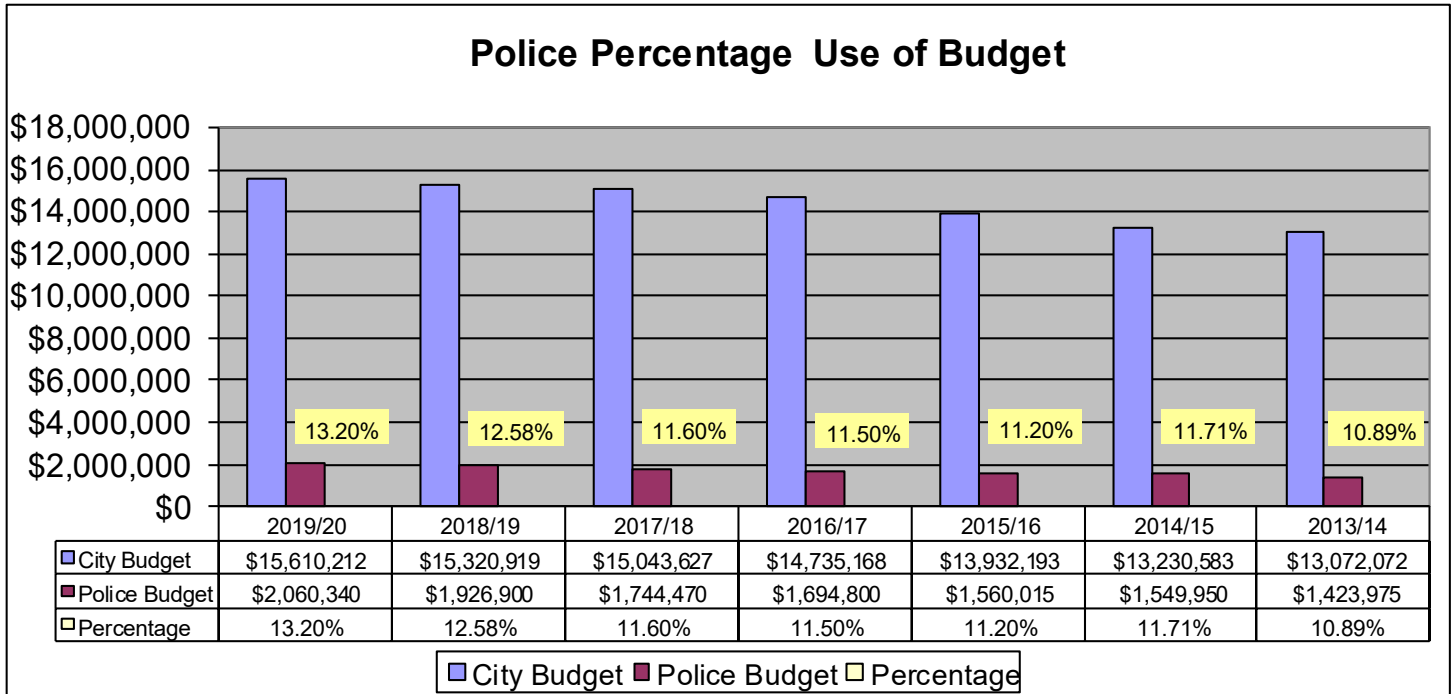

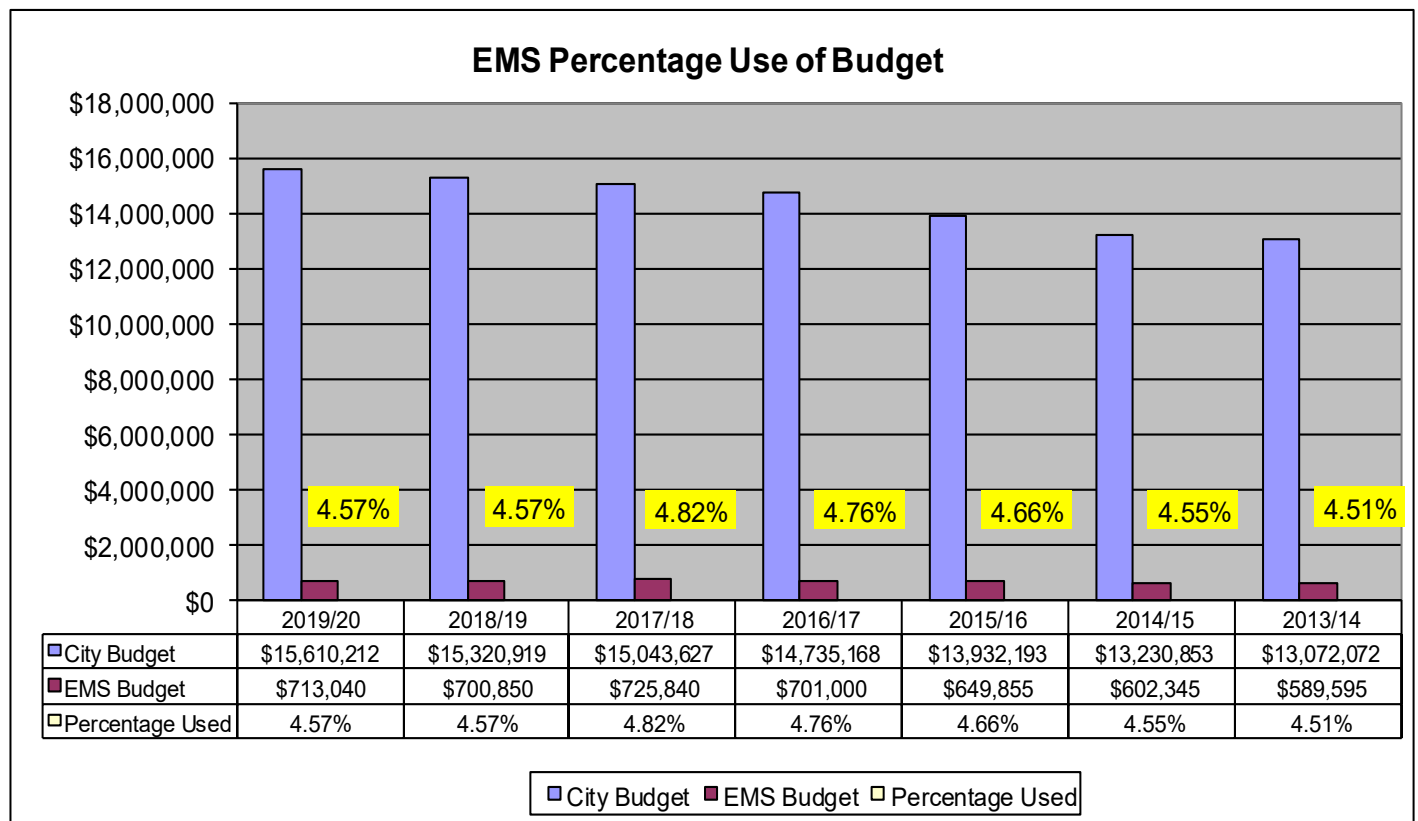
EMS Billed & Collected

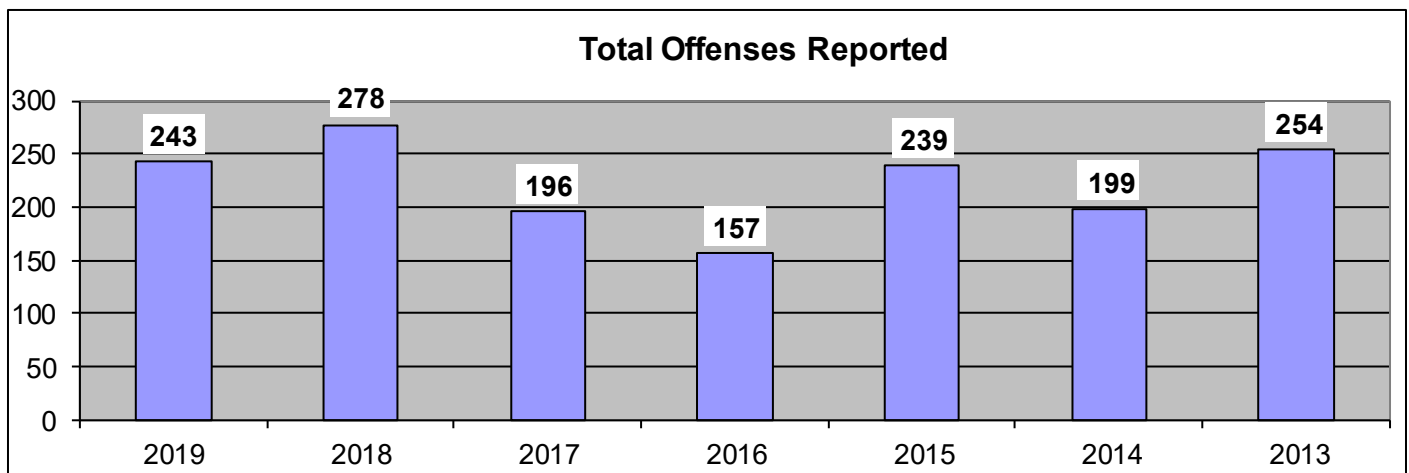

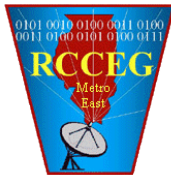
